

A RESOLUTION AND CONTRACT FOR AN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN OKLAHOMA COUNTY AND THE GREATER OKLAHOMA CITY CHAMBER TO PROMOTE ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT WITHIN OKALHOMA COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Oklahoma County (BOCC) is empowered by Title 19 Oklahoma Statutes, Section 1101, et seq., to financially support programs that support economic development for Oklahoma County, and

WHEREAS, the Order adopted by the BOCC for the purpose of sending the 2008 general obligation bond issue proposition to the voters, and the Proposition itself, states that the bond issue is to provide funds for the purpose of economic and community development in Oklahoma County, including but not limited to the acquisition of the land and building owned by GM, and efforts to protect and expand Tinker AFB, and

WHERAS, the Order further states that the bonds shall be limited to economic and community development purposes in Oklahoma County as defined in O.S. 62 § 802, and

WHEREAS, the Order further states that to the extent the proceeds can be used for the purpose of encouraging economic development within Oklahoma County by providing loans, grants or other incentives in the furtherance of job creation and private investment in the community, and

WHEREAS, the bond issue was approved by the voters of Oklahoma County on May 13, 2008, and

WHEREAS, Section 2 of the Order states, “to the extent the proceeds are not used for the acquisition of the property, they may be used to provide improvements to, or preserve such facility and property, or for the purpose of encouraging economic development within Oklahoma County by providing loans, grants, or other incentives in the furtherance of job creation and private investment in the community,” and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of Oklahoma County’s Bond Counsel proceeds derived from Proposition One may be used by the County for the furtherance of Economic Development in the county via contract with the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, and

WHEREAS, It has been the established practice for Oklahoma County to utilize unused proceeds of previous bond issues in a similar manner with the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, and

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WHEREAS, some bond issue proceeds remain unused following acquisition of the property owned by GM, and

WHEREAS, the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber (Chamber) is uniquely prepared and able to assist Oklahoma County in supporting programs and activities which encourage economic development within Oklahoma County, including but not limited to activities related to the growth and sustainment of Tinker Air Force Base and the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center (Tinker). Attached hereto contains an overview of the Chamber's unique abilities to conduct and generate economic development within Oklahoma County. (See Exhibit "A")

BE IT NOW THEREFORE RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Oklahoma County to hereby enter into the following contract with the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber:

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CONTRACT

1. Chamber will engage in approved economic development programs in Oklahoma County as outlined in the "Order" passed by the BoCC:
 - a. The Order states, "to provide funds for the purpose of Economic and Community Development in Oklahoma County, including but not limited to the acquisition of the land and building currently owned by GM."
 - b. Section 2 further outlines the use of unused proceeds, "to the extent the proceeds are not used for the acquisition of the property, they may be used to provide improvements to, or preserve such facility and property, or for the purpose of encouraging economic development within Oklahoma County by providing loans, grants, or other incentives in the furtherance of job creation and private investment in the community."
 - c. Attachment A outlines the program of work for FY 2011.
2. BOCC will reimburse Chamber for expenses incurred to conduct approved programs and activities, provided that Chamber properly invoices BOCC, in a manner acceptable to BOCC, with sufficient documentation to show said expenses were directly related to approved professional services, programs and activities for economic development in Oklahoma County, including preserving and expanding Tinker. Total reimbursement under this agreement will not exceed Two Hundred Thousand dollars (\$200,000.00) for Fiscal Year 2011.

Said expenses must fall into the following categories:

Personnel - To include personnel involved in the workings of Economic and Community Development in Oklahoma County. – At established hourly rates approved by the county.

Professional consultant service - At contract rates, for economic development assistance in program delivery.

Travel and per diem expenses - To include travel costs, conference registrations, hotel expenses, meals, (not to exceed the Federal or state approved rate, whichever is less) and other costs directly related to this Agreement.

Maintenance and Operation - To include miscellaneous supplies, printing, postage, etc., related directly to this Agreement, upon approval by BOCC.

Other areas of expense related to Economic Development must be submitted to BOCC for its consideration prior to the incurring of said expense.

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3. Chamber agrees that underlying financial records related to this Agreement will be open to review and audit by BOCC. No expenses will be reimbursed or paid directly by BOCC if BOCC determines the work or claim was not directly related to Economic Development in Oklahoma County.

To the extent possible under law, BOCC shall assist the Chamber in protecting confidential, trade secret and copyrighted documents, whether disclosed or not under the terms hereof, by notifying the Chamber of any such request and providing the Chamber the reasonable opportunity to file an appropriate action precluding the release of such documents by BOCC. Provided, however, the Chamber shall intervene on its own behalf to establish all grounds for protecting its confidential, trade secret and copyrighted documents at any hearing to determine same.

The Chamber agrees to collect and maintain records and to provide to BOCC upon its request information related to the documentation of the accomplishment of and reporting on the Program of Work under this Agreement. Provided, however, BOCC agrees, to the extent permitted by law, to work with the Chamber to maintain the confidentiality of information related to prospects. Provided, however, it shall be the obligation of the Chamber to intervene, on its own behalf to protect its confidential, trade secret and copyrighted documents at any hearing or to initiate any action to determine same.

4. Chamber will provide written semi-annual reports to BOCC on the activities and accomplishments that result from their efforts in Economic Development and on Tinker-related activities.
5. This Agreement shall be effective July 1, 2010 and shall continue through June 30, 2011, upon BOCC approval. Either party may cancel this Agreement upon thirty days written notice. If this Agreement is cancelled, BOCC will pay only those approved reimbursable costs to the date of cancellation. This Agreement may be renewed by BOCC each fiscal year beginning July 1, upon the mutual consent of both parties.



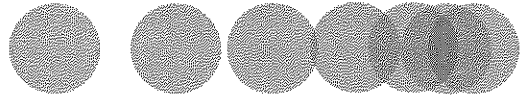

Background

The Greater Oklahoma City Chamber and the Oklahoma City Economic Development Foundation are the principal economic development organization(s) for Oklahoma City and County. The Economic Development Division takes the lead role in assisting in the growth and expansion of businesses, recruiting new companies to the Greater Oklahoma City region and creating economic opportunities through primary job creation.

Economic Development Division Mission

The Greater Oklahoma City Chamber Economic Development Division will lead business efforts to grow existing industries, recruit new companies and develop an active entrepreneurial environment, resulting in quality job creation and a diverse economy.

Economic Development Vision

Oklahoma County, the best location for business: quality people and quality place in a business-friendly climate.

Economic Development Values

- **Partnerships:** We build strong coalitions with our local and regional partners that facilitate participation in our economic growth and success. When areas have capacity to perform economic development initiatives, we collaborate with partners to deliver services; when they do not, we will work to provide capacity, and related services, as needed.
- **Diversity:** We appreciate all aspects of Oklahoma's economy. Our cultural, economic and demographic diversity all contribute to a vital business community. We recognize that a healthy economy is based on a combination of people, place and work.

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- **Excellence:** We make responsible decisions that are in the best interest of the region. We look at all options and evaluate the consequences with a sense of purpose and a view to the future. We are dynamic and creative. We hold ourselves accountable to the highest standards, both professionally and ethically.
- **Results:** We constantly monitor our performance and outcomes to ensure achievement of our mission and goals, and we continuously explore ways to improve our operating processes and systems.

Purpose and Objectives of This Application

The purpose of this economic development application is to continue to grow and diversify the Greater Oklahoma City regional economy through a clear economic vision for the future and a set of outcomes and strategies to implement this vision. This application focuses on a subset of the overall plan; Tinker Air Force Base and the partnerships it will take to retain and grow the state's largest single site employer; and on the creation of primary jobs and traded sector industries, which typically pay above average wages and have a high multiplier effect on other parts of the economy.

To encourage economic prosperity and new opportunities, this application consists of two strategic objectives that foster the creation of quality jobs, competitive businesses and a healthy economy in the Greater Oklahoma City region.

Strategies

Retain and Grow Existing Businesses

RETENSION AND EXPANSION

Strategy	2010-11 Target
Company Visits: Continue to call on new and existing companies to identify retention and expansion needs, with a focus on the targeted industry segments of aviation and aerospace; and prime and subcontractors for Tinker AFB.	30 companies annually with a Tinker focus.
Technical Assistance: Follow-up with company visits and assist companies in addressing expansion needs. Connect companies to state and regional resources, and Tinker AFB.	Provide assistance to all companies needing support; minimum 50% of companies contacted.
Issue Identification: Use calls, technical assistance, partner input and other efforts to provide intelligence to Oklahoma City and County on retention and expansion issues in Greater Oklahoma City.	Annual report each August.

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Staffing will include two business retention and expansion managers; manager of research, contract staff, and senior management of the Chamber.

Aerospace: Continue to facilitate an increasing level of collaboration among academic, business and government leadership in support of Tinker Air Force Base. Develop relationships at the Federal level and watch for potential political challenges as we work to grow workload. Provide consulting services related to Public Policy and Economic Development support for Tinker AFB. Assist with marketing and recruitment of Aerospace companies to the Tinker Aerospace Complex (TAC), ensuring that the County's investment in acquiring the former GM facility for Tinker AFB has an ROI in terms of protecting and enhancing Tinker's current and future workload, bringing jobs and investment.	Continue with quarterly Tinker Leadership Council events; market and recruit aerospace companies to the TAC facility; continue with contract staff for Tinker assistance; continue the annual "fly-in" to Washington, D.C. for regional leaders to visit Congressional Delegation and the Pentagon.
Aerospace: Continue to recruit Aerospace jobs to Tinker, the Maintenance, Repair, Overhaul Technology Center (MROTC) and Will Rogers World Airport. Support the efforts of the MROTC and the Airport Trust, the City of OKC and Oklahoma County in product development.	Complete priority list with Tinker each year for needs; work on future workload for Tinker and the MROTC; work with Will Rogers World Airport to assist companies to grow and expand.

Staffing will include Senior Business Development Manager for Aviation and Aerospace; Director of Business Development; Business Development Manager for Manufacturing; contract staff as well as senior management team of the Chamber.

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Tactics

- A. Establish Tinker Air Force Base as a Center of Excellence for engine and MRO (Maintenance, Repair, and Overhaul), and the facility of choice for contractor workload.
 - (1) Use contract staff to work with Tinker AFB.
 - (2) Play a key role with the Depot Caucus in working Federal issues affecting Tinker AFB.
 - (3) Create white papers that will consist of priority issues the County, Chamber and other leadership (including the state) should be aware of and work to support or defend, as it relates to Tinker AFB. This will be developed "as discovered".
 - (4) Create partnerships with the private sector to further the Center of Excellence.

- B. Develop further physical infrastructure for Tinker AFB.
 - (1) Work with Tinker on their master facilities plan.
 - (2) Recruit workload related to Tinker AFB that will fit the Tinker Aerospace Complex, MROTC, or other public or private sites in Oklahoma County.

- C. The Chamber is the primary economic development contact for aerospace companies.
 - (1) Host the Central Oklahoma Aerospace Forum Reception, annually; participate in the annual Oklahoma Aerospace Summit.
 - (2) Continue to identify issues affecting local companies, and address ongoing issues.
 - (3) Work with the Oklahoma Aeronautics Commission, the Oklahoma Aerospace Institute, and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce on implementation of statewide aerospace strategies.

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Budget Request

The proposed budget for 2010-2011 would be \$200,000. The specific use of these funds would be public policy and economic development support for Tinker Air Force Base and the surrounding suppliers and contractors; and ongoing retention and expansion efforts in the ten (10) county region, as they relate to Tinker.

Expanded Effort at Tinker AFB

The Chamber is part of an overall economic development effort between local businesses and federal government agencies in the greater Oklahoma City area. The focus of this effort is on activities at the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center (OC-ALC), and military organizations at Tinker AFB. The Chamber has created a process to develop and sustain a strategic plan for Tinker AFB. This involves bringing community and military leaders together to jointly identify priorities for development and funding.

The effort utilizes consulting services related to Public Policy Support of Tinker AFB, with particular attention to its logistics support mission, advanced technologies, and physical infrastructure requirements. The Chamber will track federal policy and budgetary actions and issues affecting the Department of Defense, Air Force, Navy Wing, and Tinker AFB. We will pay particular attention to issues potentially affecting the economic impact on the commercial and academic infrastructure of the Oklahoma City Region.

The objectives of this Public Policy Support effort are to:

- Influence Air Force and Department of Defense with a favorable perception of the relevance and value of Tinker AFB, so that it remains a vital, national center of excellence for aerospace logistics management, weapons systems sustainment, and acquisition;
- Monitor Department of Defense and Air Force enterprise research, development, acquisition, and sustainment policy and execution;
- Assist in sustaining and growing the economic impact of Tinker AFB upon the Oklahoma City Region and the entire State of Oklahoma.

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The day-to-day work will be focused on:

- Maintaining a liaison with a network of Tinker AFB personnel at the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center, host-base organizations, and tenant activities on Tinker AFB;
- Advising the City, County and State on developments, policies, and issues of interest to the community, particularly those potentially affecting, either positively or adversely, the economic impact of Tinker AFB upon the Oklahoma City Region and Oklahoma;
- Preparing Issue or White Papers consisting of priority issues the Chamber should be aware of and working on with local and State government, as well as the Oklahoma federal delegation. Papers will be prepared and submitted on an “as discovered” basis. Executive level briefings will be made when deemed required by the Chamber and partners;
- Recommending actions to influence the growth and sustainment of Tinker AFB organizations, and assisting with other activities to promote and enhance research interaction, technology transfer, and strategic partnerships among Tinker AFB activities and the Oklahoma City Region’s academic, industrial, and commercial services infrastructure.

For 2010-11, County funds will be leveraged with Oklahoma City Contract funds, FOKC III/IV, and Chamber funds, **for a total leverage of over \$1.7 million**. When possible, we will also leverage with Regional Partners and other sponsorship funds. The leverage will be in the areas of recruitment, retention and expansion; strategy development; research and product development.

We feel this strong financial leverage is a key indicator of our commitment to this effort. In addition, the ability to use the skills of all of our economic development professionals (as well as contract expertise) shows a deep, strong focus on economic development.

Oklahoma County has participated with the Oklahoma City Economic Development Foundation for many years, as a partner in economic development. This application will further solidify our strong working partnership.

The County funds would be for personnel and limited program work. Reports will be supplied as required by the County Contract Officer, twice a year.

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Economic Impact

At the end of the document the metrics section measures the five-year economic impact of these efforts. Please also note, this application serves the entire county. Therefore, we encompass all target areas, based on the Tinker workforce, suppliers and contractors covered by the scope of this work.

Key data on aviation and aerospace industry in Oklahoma County

The Greater Oklahoma City Chamber released the second part of *The Greater Oklahoma City Region Aerospace and Aviation Industry* done by Mark C. Snead, Ph.D., director of Oklahoma State University's Center for Applied Economic Research. The first phase of the study, released in 2006, identified the government entities and private firms comprising the aviation and aerospace industry in the Greater Oklahoma City region and documented the broad economic impacts generated by the industry. The second phase of this report further refines and expands the economic impact study by assessing the size and composition of the Oklahoma City region's aerospace and aviation industry. Major findings of the phase two study are:

- The aerospace and aviation industry remains one of the foundational industries in the state - a high wage technology-intensive industry that has an expansive presence statewide. The economic development push underway to transform the state's existing aerospace and aviation assets into a more streamlined and competitive business model recognizes the enormous long-term growth potential of the industry.

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- **Oklahoma's aerospace and aviation sector is often overlooked in comparative studies of the industry across states because of the high concentration of federal government hiring at the largest facility in the state, Tinker AFB.** Most existing studies focus only on private sector employment and manufacturing in particular, and neither characteristic adequately captures the structure of the industry in Oklahoma. When viewed using databases that include federal workers, Oklahoma ranks among the top ten states in terms of employment in most traditional aerospace occupations.

For example, the state ranks 12th in aerospace engineers, 5th in aircraft mechanics and service technicians, and 8th in avionics technicians when using occupation-based data that includes federal employees.

- The aerospace and aviation assets in the 10-county Greater Oklahoma City region position the region to accommodate significant growth in future years. The 265 firms and 38,000 workers that comprise the sector in the region represent the largest aviation cluster in the state. Tinker AFB and the FAA's Monroney Aeronautical Center, both federal government employers, largely dominate the industry, but the business mix at both facilities enjoys a strong synergy with private sector aerospace and aviation activity. The size and scope of the MRO infrastructure surrounding Tinker is conducive to attracting private sector MRO work to the region, while the broad range of activities at the FAA Center reaches across all elements of commercial and general aviation.
- The aerospace and aviation workforce in the central region is large and developed and capable of serving a diverse set of industry needs. The MRO operation at Tinker AFB relies on the largest group of civilian Air Force personnel in the fifty states and has generated a strong market for not only MRO personnel but for most white-collar aviation-related occupations as well. The Monroney Center develops aviation professionals across a broad range of specialties and approximately one-fourth of the workforce holds an engineering-based occupation.
- Both Tinker AFB and the Monroney Center share segments of the labor market with each other and with private sector aerospace and aviation firms in the region. All segments of the industry share the market for approximately 4,000 workers with engineering occupations. Tinker makes up only 60 percent of the labor market for nearly 5,000 installation, maintenance, and repair workers, with Tinker contractors and other private sector firms who perform maintenance

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work for the commercial and general aviation industry employing the remainder. Tinker also largely drives the market for production workers, however one-third of production jobs remain in the private sector. The total number of transportation and material moving occupations are shared roughly equally between Tinker and private sector firms; however the private sector maintains a much higher relative concentration of transportation occupations. A large pool of aerospace and aviation industry managerial talent is also concentrated in the region, with more than 550 workers whose primary job activity is management. And a strong training infrastructure is in place in the region comprising nearly 400 workers in aviation and aerospace whose primary job activity is education and training.

- Federal procurement contracting remains an important component of the aerospace and aviation industry in Oklahoma. In FY2006, 793 vendors across the state captured an estimated \$1.439 billion in federal contracts for the provision of aerospace and aviation related goods and services in FY2006. Sixty-one percent of all federal contracting within the state in FY2006 was related to aerospace and aviation applications. Contracting activity is highly concentrated in the 10-county Greater Oklahoma City region where 609 vendors secured \$1.089 billion in funding, or more than 75 percent of the statewide total. Oklahoma County firms alone completed more than 98 percent of the contracts issued in the 10-county region, or more than \$1 billion in federal contracts.

All of the assets are in place to elevate Oklahoma's standing in the aerospace community in the coming years. Key employers and infrastructure are in place and a world-class labor pool is available at competitive wage rates in the local region. Procurement success will likely expand significantly as the industry in the region matures. These factors suggest that Oklahoma's aerospace and aviation industry is poised to reach new levels of success.
